Why Build New Grade 5-12 School, but Remodel Rippleside

- **High School is in a land-locked location with limited options**
 - *High School built in current location in 1936 before Hwy 210 traffic*
 - *Community task force says that Repair/Remodel Plan will not address the high school's needs*
 - *Expensive to add additional land, as Aitkin has built their homes and businesses around the school*
- **On the other hand, Rippleside is already in a good location and a better building to remodel**
 - *Significant upgrades to building in recent years*






New Grade 5-12 Campus





Cost of Meeting Our Needs

School improvements can be paid for by:

- **Bond referendum with voter approval?**
- **Increase the school district tax levy using financing tools that don't require voter approval?**
- **Fund balance?**
 - *The District's savings account*
- **Operating budget?**
 - *Money for that could be used in the classroom or for costs of operations*



Cost of Meeting Our Needs

Task Force Plan

- The school bond referendum asks voters to approve a \$68,500,000 plan, to be repaid over 20 years
- The estimated tax impact on a home valued at \$100,000 is \$19 a month

Questions?

Is the land included in the referendum?

No, the land will be paid for with existing district funds.



Questions?

Is the cost of utilities for the new site included?

Yes, all site utilities are included in the project costs.



Questions?

Is the cost of the Referendum \$68.5M or \$103M?

The total project cost is budgeted at \$68.5M. Much like a mortgage on a house, the bonds will be paid back with interest – current rates are between 2 and 3 percent.



Questions?

Is the enrollment declining?

According to the enrollment projection study, there will be a slight decline over time in our enrollment. This is consistent with what we have seen in our district over time.



Questions?

Do we gain or lose students to open enrollment?

We have been fortunate over the years to see a gain from open enrollment, which we believe is due to our excellent teaching staff. However, in recent years it is almost even.



Questions?

Will a new school increase open enrollment?

There is no way of predicting the future, but we feel that putting excellent teachers in an improved facility will help to bring more kids into Aitkin Public School.



Questions?

Is the new school building smaller than our existing building?

Yes. We have completed a study that shows we do not maximize the space that we currently have, and we can reduce the square footage while retaining the flexibility in case our enrollment grows.



Questions?

Is the new school going to be more efficient than the existing building?

The existing energy usage of the High School is very low. The new school will be bringing in more fresh air to the classrooms -- this may use more energy but will provide a healthier environment.

If the referendum doesn't pass, the existing HS would need a similar system.



Questions?

Will the new property be annexed into the City of Aitkin?

The school board hasn't taken a position on annexation. Preliminary discussions with the City of Aitkin have taken place. Now that the purchase agreement has been finalized, further planning will take place.



Questions?

Will you have the land prior to the election?

Yes. A purchase agreement is now in place.

The purchase agreement is for 221.73 acres of land owned by Gary and Mary Lindgren in Section 36 of Aitkin Township.



Questions?

What will you do with the existing building?

The property will be offered for sale to interested parties.

If that is not successful, we will clear the site and sell the land.

How much do we have in the fund balance?

Per the most recent audited financials (as of June 30, 2015), the District has an unassigned fund balance of \$5,891,639.


