PRIORITIZE PLAY!

We know the best way to help children learn and grow is to play and interact with them! Children develop speech, language, and social skills through playing with peers and adults. Have fun during everyday interactions like bath time, meal time, and at the grocery store.

Screen time will not promote your child's development, but we can't ignore that, allowed occasionally, it can help you get through a busy day. Whenever possible, when your child watches media on your phone or tablet, talk about it or even re-enact it together!



Girls who Math

On November 8, 2023, nine female Aitkin High School students spent Sonia Kovalevsky (SK) Day at the University of Wisconsin-Superior campus. Sonia Kovalevsky (1850-1891) was the first female mathematics professor in the world and she paved the way for other women in the field of mathematics. SK Day is an event created with the goal of increasing the number of girls continuing their studies in mathematics after high school. The event featured a keynote speaker who is a mathematical statistician for the Environmental Protection Agency. The event also provided two math workshops, a campus scavenger hunt, and a career exploration showcase for the students. The career exploration showcase provided eight different examples where women in the Duluth/Superior area are using math and their math-related degrees every day. Some of the careers featured were in the areas of meteorology, healthcare, marketing, sales, data analysis, and environmental sustainability, with companies such as WDIO, Essentia, Maurices, Cirrus Aircraft, Amsoil, & ALL FTF.

Aitkin School Board Officially Adopts Five Year Strategic Plan The plan was developed with strong community participation

At their school board meeting on December 18, 2023, the Aitkin Public Schools Board formally adopted a new strategic plan that will guide the district for the next five years.

The process involved a number of ways for community stakeholders to be involved including Internal and External Surveys. Listening Sessions were held with community members, staff, and students. A Strategic Planning Committee made up of almost 30 stakeholders assisted in the development of the new plan. Gail Gilman, Director of Strategic Planning and Board Leadership with the Minnesota School Boards Association assisted in the development and facilitation of the planning process and provided guidance to the district throughout.

Connecting with community members during this process allowed for a greater understanding of the community and what role the school needs to play within the district Students and Staff also took an active role during the development of the belief, mission, and vision statements. The plan is community inspired and community focused.

The new Aitkin Public Schools Strategic Plan provides a series of belief statements that will guide decision making in the district as well as a new mission statement and vision statement to update what Aitkin Public Schools stands for. The new mission statement for Aitkin Public Schools is **"To inspire and prepare our students with the tools and skills to succeed in an everchanging world."** This mission statement will be updated throughout district materials to set a new course for Aitkin Public Schools.

A new Vision Statement was also adopted by the district, one that came directly from community members who served on the Strategic Planning Committee. **Strong relationships. Innovative education. We are ISD #1** is the new vision of the district which puts a focus directly on student achievement, which is one of the newly established focus areas for goals.
